

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


FRIENDS OF ST BEDE'S CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL

ST MATTHEW

St. Matthew, one of the twelve apostles, was a pivotal figure in the early Christian church. Originally named Levi, he was a tax collector in Capernaum, a profession often viewed with disdain by the Jewish people due to its association with Roman oppression and corruption. Despite this, Matthew's life took a remarkable turn when he encountered Jesus.

One day, while sitting at his tax booth, Matthew was called by Jesus to follow him. This transformative moment led to Matthew abandoning his lucrative career and



becoming one of the closest disciples of Christ. He witnessed many of Jesus' miracles, teachings, and pivotal events, including the Last Supper.

After the death and resurrection of Jesus, Matthew devoted his life to spreading the teachings of Christianity. He is traditionally credited with authoring the Gospel of Matthew, one of the four accounts of Jesus' life in the New Testament. This gospel is particularly notable for its emphasis on the fulfilment of Old Testament prophecies and its teachings on morality and ethics.

Matthew's missionary work took him to various places, including Ethiopia and possibly Persia, where he preached to diverse communities. His efforts in



spreading Christianity helped lay the foundation for the faith in these regions. Tradition holds that he died a martyr's death, demonstrating great courage in his convictions.

St. Matthew's legacy endures. His life reminds us that change is possible, regardless of our past.

WEEKLY WORSHIP AND PRAYER

Prayer and worship is integral to the ethos of our school and it is important that our children lead their own worship. This term we have seen the first of our classes prepare and lead their own worship for their families. Year 4 began leading a worship in October which supported their peers in understanding how to pray the rosary to celebrate the month of



the rosary. Year 6 have also led us in worship this term preparing us for Advent. The children were respectful, informative and prayerful as they led the school in prayer. We can't wait for our other classes to lead us in prayer later in the year.

Each week within all classes in school, prayer

ambassadors are chosen. These children lead their class in prayer multiple times a day and model respectful prayer. Our prayer ambassadors are changed weekly to allow all children in school to have this experience. They help lead a range of prayers including our school prayer, the Lord's Prayer and the Hail Mary. During the month of October these prayer ambassadors helped support their classes in praying the rosary. Harry in Year 2 said "I loved"



making my rosary and I could help my friends learn how to use it."

SUPER SOUP!

On Monday 7th October we invited families into school to help us celebrate Harvest. Our families gathered to hear KS2 and our choir sing some wonderful harvest songs.

Throughout the week the children were involved in helping to create our community soup. We were overwhelmed with plentiful donations and Early Years helped to sort the vegetables. KS1 then washed all of the donations before KS2

peeled and chopped. Our very own Mrs Craik then turned this into a wonderful vegetable soup to be shared with our community. Our hall was beautifully decorated by Miss Craik's floral arrangements and Ms Styles' autumn crafts. It was a real whole school effort and a wonderful afternoon.











THE LIVING SIMPLY AWARD

This year at St Bede's we will be striving to gain the Living Simply award. This award inspired by Pope Francis's message asks us to answer the call for us to care for our common home and stand in solidarity with our sisters and brothers around the world.

This project is a large undertaking and different initiative will be launched throughout the year. This half term Eco Club have begun by looking at our school grounds and trying to create more sustainable areas. They have created their own bird feeders to help ensure our school grounds can be a sustainable home for a range of wildlife. Harrison in Year 4 who is part of Eco Club said "I enjoyed making the birdfeeders and we can watch them being used at break and lunchtimes". ADVENT PREPARATIONS

CURRICULUM

NSPCC

This half term some of our children have taken part in the NSPCC's "Speak out. Stay safe. Programme". Speak out. Stay safe. is a programme for children which aims to help



children understand abuse in all its forms and to recognise the signs of abuse. Children are taught to speak out if they are worried, either to a safe adult or Childline. The children who accessed this program found it to be informative and powerful. The children had great things to say about the program;






SPORTS NEWS
